

ABORIGINALS MOVING IN

BUSLOADS of aboriginal volunteers are heading for Canberra prepared for a new confrontation with police.

One of their organisers said last night: "We are going to get smashed."

"But it has to be done. We have to show Australia and overseas what is happening."

Students and trade unionists in Brisbane collected more than \$700 to pay for three busloads of demonstrators to make the trip.

Another bus is due from Sydney today.

The aborigines will try to replace their tent "embassy," which was torn down by police outside Parliament House on Thursday.

The embassy aborigines have taken out a writ against the Interior Minister, Mr Hunt, claiming that the new order banning trespass on federal land is unconstitutional.

The writ calls for Mr Hunt and the ACT police to be restrained from interfering with the re-erection of the tents and their contents on unleased federal land.

Mr Justice Fox of the ACT Supreme Court granted leave for the injunction to be issued after hearing legal

counsel for the aborigines in his chambers.

The writ will be served on Mr Hunt over the weekend.

However, Mr Justice Fox refused to grant a temporary injunction to restrain Mr Hunt or the police from interfering with the immediate re-erection of the tents.

The full writ will be heard in the ACT Supreme Court next Tuesday.

Before leaving Brisbane yesterday, Black Panther Leader, Mr Denis Walker said those taking part in the trip were "prepared for violence."

He visited Queensland University yesterday to raise money from students for the trip and

talk with radical leaders.

"We do not know how long we will be away, but we intend to get the embassy going again at whatever the cost," Mr Walker said.

The president of the Building Workers' Industrial Union, Mr H. Hamilton, said yesterday he had introduced Mr Walker to trade union leaders at the Brisbane Trades Hall, and cash had been given to help his campaign.

VICTORIA'S Aboriginal Affairs Minister, Mr Meagher, yesterday urged "more talk and less violence" in relations with aborigines.

Mr Meagher condemned both sides in Thursday's brawl in Canberra.

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
